The conference component at Ryerson University will attempt to tie together this abundance as it mediates and navigates the change that approaches with the new millennium.

Food for scholarly discussion? Yes, and CELAFI also embraces theatre productions, visual arts exhibits, a film festival and hot dance music, jazz and world music in the clubs. Harbourfront Centre is the hub of all the action. That's where you will find a little of everything: children's activities to contemporary dance productions, plus an artist's market featuring diasporic African craftspeople from throughout the world, and unforgettable music of all kinds. Over 400,000 people are expected at the conference and festival.

Revue Noire editor Simon Njami will be present for conference panels. Two special events are planned: June 23 (publication launch) and July 12 at Harbourfront Centre (CD release).

CELAFI in Chatham: The Celebrations continue in Chatham, Ontario, one of the major disembarkation points on the Underground Railroad. A multimedia visual arts exhibition, "Transforming the Image", runs at the Thames Gallery in Chatham, Ontario from July 5 to September 14. It features work in a variety of media by over a dozen senior black imagemakers from across Canada, including Jim Adams and Artis Lane. An exhibit by the Chatham Kent Museum features the lives and contributions of early black settlers in the area.

**Beatrice Chancy by George Elliott Clarke:** Theatre media darling Colin Taylor directs the world premiere of the first full stage production by this remarkable Nova Scotia poet at Theatre Passe Muraille Mainstage from July 8 to 20.

The Spiritual Impulse: July 10 and 11 sees a thrilling programme of contemporary dance at the du Maurier Theatre at Harbourfront Centre, featuring a Toronto premiere by Montreal's mesmerizing Zab Maboungou of Compagnie Danse Nyata (Thursday) and Toronto's Learie McNicoll (Myth Production, Friday) with Scotland's Rosina Bonsu on both evenings.

Who's Been Sleeping with Little Jack Horner: An unprecedented gathering of legendary storytellers at Harbourfront Centre on Saturday, July 12. This evening of tall tales and calypso promises to be a showdown of epic proportions - and it's definitely not intended for children's ears!

Mamlambo dir *Palesa ka Letlaka-Nkosi*, South Africa, 30 min, 35 mm/video - Canadian premiere! "Set in the urban wasteland of inner city Johannesburg, Mamlambo is a film about the chance and magical meeting of Malusi, a homeless streetchild, and Tinyie a Chinese child prostitute. The film is based on the South African mythological story of Mamlambo – a magical shape shifter who changes peoples destinies". Palesa ka Letlaka-Nkosi

**Voices of Change: Women of Zimbabwe** dir *Joanne Burke*, Zimbabwe/USA, 26:30 min, video, 1996 - North American premiere of this story of five women in Zimbabwe who dare to take on non-traditional roles.
